<b>Heading</b>	Bureau of Animal and Plant Health Inspection and Quarantine of Taiwan notified the World Organization for Animal Health (OIE) a confirmed Low Pathogenic Notifiable Avian Influenza (LPNAI) H5N2 outbreak case that occurred on 20.12.2012.
<b>The incident</b>	The H5N2 virus was isolated on a native chicken farm in Ma-Gong, Penghu County during the intensified surveillance programme conducted on poultry farms surrounding the first H5N2 affected farm in Peng-Hu county in 2012.

<b>Position of CFS</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Hong Kong did not import any live poultry or poultry meat from Taiwan, but there was a small quantity of poultry eggs imported from Taiwan.</li> <li>- In response to outbreaks of H5N2 avian influenza in Penghu and Chiayi counties in November 2012, the Centre for Food Safety has suspended import of poultry eggs from these two counties since 23.11.2012.</li> <li>- Imported poultry meat and meat products must be accompanied with valid certificate attesting that the meat or meat products are derived from poultry which have been kept and slaughtered from NAI free countries, zones or compartments according to an established import protocol.</li> <li>- CFS will remain vigilant and monitor for any new development and take appropriate actions when necessary.</li> </ul>
