Position of CFS	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Information on product distribution outside Slovakia is not available from the websites of the Public Health Authority of the Slovak Republic and the media. The Centre for Food Safety (CFS) is investigating whether the affected product has been

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imported to Hong Kong and is contacting the relevant authority for further information. Preliminary investigation did not identify local sale or import of the affected product.

- Acquisition of the product through online purchase or international travel cannot be excluded.
- Consumers should discard the product and not consume it.
- CFS will remain vigilant and monitor for any new development and take appropriate actions when necessary.
- Investigation by CFS is ongoing.
- *Cronobacter sakazakii* is a pathogen that generally causes disease only in people with weakened immune systems. The bacterium can cause invasive infections (e.g. sepsis or meningitis) in infant. Neonates (≤ 28 days old) and infants less than 2 months of age, in particular those that are pre-term, low-birth-weight (< 2.5 kg) and immunocompromised, are at greatest risk. Powdered infant formulae were established as the source of *C. sakazakii*.
