Affected products: • Bivalve shellfish such as mussels, oysters, tuatua, pipi, toheroa, cockles, and scallops, as well as pūpū (cat's eyes), Cook's turban and kina (sea urchin)
 At this stage, finfish are not included in the public health warning, but New Zealand Food Safety advise people to gut the fish and discard the liver before cooking.

 According to the information of MPI, commercially harvested shellfish – sold in shops and supermarkets, or exported – is subject to strict water and flesh monitoring programmes by MPI. Acquisition of the products through international travel cannot be excluded. Lyngbyatoxin-A is a biotoxin which can cause skin and eye irritation and respiratory issues. It is heat-stable and cannot be destroyed through cooking. Consumers should discard the products and not consume them.
