<b>Heading</b>	<p>The US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) – An advisory alerting parents and caregivers not to feed Crecelac Infant Powdered Goat Milk Infant Formula and Farmalac BABY Powdered Infant Formula with Iron products imported and distributed by Dairy Manufacturers Inc. to infants, because of concerns of <i>Cronobacter</i> contamination for the Crecelac product, and failure to meet US infant formula regulations for Farmalac products.</p>
<b>The incident</b>	<p>The US FDA issued an advisory alerting parents and caregivers not to feed Crecelac Infant Powdered Goat Milk Infant Formula and Farmalac BABY Powdered Infant Formula with Iron products imported and distributed by Dairy Manufacturers Inc. to infants, because of concerns of <i>Cronobacter</i> contamination for the Crecelac product, and failure to meet US infant formula regulations for Farmalac products.</p> <p>In addition, the FDA found both elevated levels of potassium and chloride and low levels of Vitamin A in Crecelac Infant Powdered Goat Milk Infant Formula.</p> <p>Recalled products:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>■ CRECELAC INFANT Powdered Goat-Milk Infant Formula with Iron 0 to 12 months - Net Wt. 12.4 oz (352g)</li> <li>■ Farmalac BABY Powdered Infant Formula with Iron 0 to 12 months Net Wt. 12.4 oz (352g)</li> <li>■ Farmalac BABY Powdered Infant Formula with Iron Low Lactose 0 to 12 months Net Wt. 12.4 oz (352g)</li> </ul> <p>Details of products being recalled are listed in the website of the FDA.</p>

<b>Position of CFS</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>• Information on product distribution outside the US is not available from the website of the FDA. The Centre for Food Safety (CFS) is investigating whether the affected products have been imported to Hong Kong and is contacting the relevant authority for further information. Preliminary investigation did not identify local sale or import of the affected products.</li><li>• Acquisition of the products through online purchase or international travel cannot be excluded.</li><li>• Consumers should discard the products and not consume them.</li><li>• CFS will remain vigilant and monitor for any new development and take appropriate actions when necessary.</li><li>• Investigation by CFS is ongoing.</li><li>• <i>Cronobacter sakazakii</i> is a pathogen that generally causes disease only in people with weakened immune systems. The bacterium can cause invasive infections (e.g. sepsis or meningitis) in infant. Neonates (<math>\leq 28</math> days old) and infants less than 2 months of age, in particular those that are pre-term, low-birth-weight (<math>&lt; 2.5</math> kg) and immunocompromised, are at greatest risk. Powdered infant formulae were established as the source of <i>C. sakazakii</i>.</li></ul>
